There are 48 known species of rattlesnake and they play a vital role in our ecosystem by helping control small rodent population.


Their biggest predator, the Kingsnake, is immune to rattlesnake venom.

Lost Tales: How Mockingbirds Got Their Song





Now that you have that fancy word to use with your friends (as long as you remember how to pronounce it), maybe you'll be interested to learn about the etymology of these words/phrases:

Through the Grapevine:

A grapevine is a system of twisty tendrils going from cluster to cluster. The communication grapevine was first mentioned in the 1850s, the telegraph era. Where the telegraph was a straight line of communication from one person to another, the "grapevine telegraph" was a message passed from person to person, with some likely twists along the way.

Hands Down:

Hands down comes from horse racing, where, if you're way ahead of everyone else, you can relax your grip on the reins and let your hands down. When you win hands down, you win easily.

Push the Envelope:

Pushing the envelope belongs to the modern era of the airplane. The flight envelope is a term from aeronautics meaning the boundary or limit of performance of a flight object. Go Haywire:


